#### **CLIMATE CHANGE**

The world's scientists have spoken clearly: climate change is the defining challenge of our age. Thousands of international scientists study the abrupt and irreversible changes of climate on our planet. A U.N. report predicted that a warming trend of 3.6 degrees Fahrenheit emitted into the atmosphere could put up to 30% of species on the planet at risk of extinction. A warming trend of 3 degrees would put millions of human beings at risk from flooding. Sea levels would rise by 28 to 43 cm, and most frightening of all, the melting of the Greenland ice sheet would swamp coastal cities.

Al Gore, Nobel Prize winner, makes strong efforts at the U.N. climate-change summit to cut greenhouse gases. He has delivered a rousing call for the world to take strong action to fight climate change without the United States, accusing his country of scuttling the United Nations conference in Bali.

All nations in the world will play a role in stopping this disaster, but their success and failure will depend on two countries: the U.S. and China, the world's two biggest carbon emitters. If they stop, we may stand a chance of preventing the grimmest consequences of climate change. If they fail, our future has been written.

#### SIMPLIFY YOUR LIFE

Years ago, a cigarette commercial asked if you were smoking more, but enjoying it less. That describes the way many of us live today. We are doing more, but enjoying it less. And when that doesn't work, we compound the problem. In our frantic search for satisfaction, we try stuffing still more into our days, never realizing that we are taking the wrong approach.

The truth is simple; so simple it is hard to believe. Satisfaction lies with less, not with more. Yet, we pursue the myth that this thing, or that activity, will provide the satisfaction we so desperately seek. Arthur Lindman, in his devastating book, "The Harried Leisure Class," described the futility of pursuing more. His research found that as income rose, people bought more things to occupy their leisure time. But, ironically, the more things they bought, the less they valued any one of them. Carried to an extreme, he predicted massive boredom in the midst of tremendous variety. The was more than twenty years ago, and his prediction seems more accurate every year.

If we would like to enjoy life more, Lindman challenges us to experiment with him. How could we simplify our lives? What could we drop? What could we stop pursuing? What few things could we concentrate on? But words will never convince us. We must try it for ourselves.
